

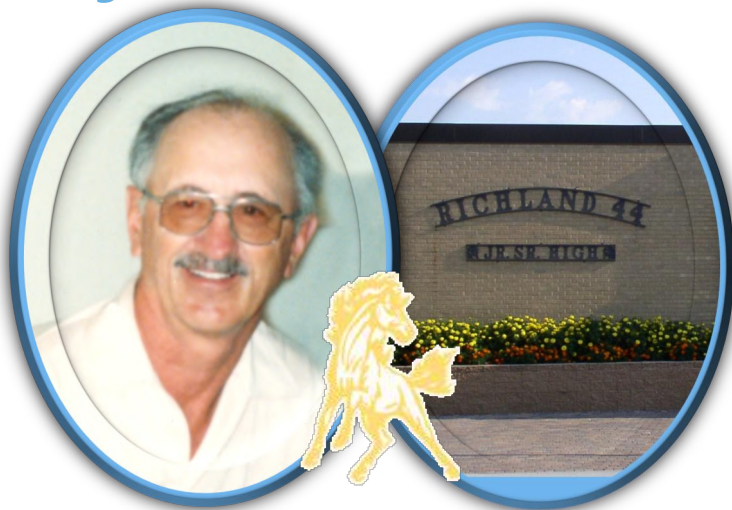

Details on scholarship qualifications and the application process are being discussed in detail with hopes to release information to the students this spring.

Scholarships will be given in the name and loving memory of Lauritz and Marie Hendrickson, Betty Hendrickson, and Darrel Hendrickson.

While the right words are hard to come up with for a gift of this magnitude, the Richland #44 School District, along with the school board, want to express how grateful we are for this overwhelmingly, generous gift that will help many students in their education endeavors. From the Elementary Principal's Desk>>>



I can't even believe that we are into the second nine weeks of the school year. I want to take this opportunity to thank all the parents who connected with teachers for parent-teacher conferences in November. Thanks to the elementary staff for their commitment to sharing information with parents. Communication between school and home is one of the greatest indicators of a child's success during his/her educational years. Do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher any time you have a question or concern.

Teacher Leadership Academy

I am pleased to tell you we have three elementary teachers participating in the first rural multidistrict Teacher Leadership Academy through NDSU and funded partially by the Burgum Foundation. This academy is made up of teachers from Richland, Wyndmere and Milnor school districts. It is the first of its kind and a model for future professional development. After 5 semesters and an enormous amount of work, Faith Rieger, Krista Readel and Tiffany Carlson will have their masters in education. During the program each participant is required to do 120 hours of practicum work. This is such a benefit to our school. Prior to the start of school these 3 teachers updated the teachers' lounge with a coat of paint and a new decor to create a space that the whole staff appreciates. They have undertaken the enormous job of gathering and organizing student data that will be a huge help to our teachers and give a very clear picture of our students - their strengths and needs. Mrs. Rieger, Miss Readel and Mrs. Carlson also plan to proof and work to update our current student and staff handbook. I am so pleased to get to be a part of the TLA and watch these professionals become leaders.

The Houses of Richland

During the 2017-18 school year, after we had seen some awesome things happening at the Ron Clark Academy, a committee of staff members met to determine how we could build relationships between our buildings and from that came the house system. The house system has all students PK-12 and staff divided into four houses: Concentrer, Bouwen, Rendement, and Virtroue, each with a crest and mission. While still in it's infancy, we are working to make the house system a beneficial experience for all students. We are striving to cultivate a spirit of camaraderie, develop student leaders, create a sense of family and belonging, provide the students with an embedded support system, assimilate new students, encourage positive behavior, and provide positive competition.



Our first event for the 2018-19 school year was held October 24th. Preschool students along with new students and staff were assigned a house. After that, the students in preschool through grade 2 went into the east high school gym to play a variety of games and the students in grades 3-12 worked as teams in their designated houses to win a variety of game and races. Cookies were served and the event ended in the west gym with all students in their house sharing their house cheer. Congratulations to Virtroue for being voted best "cheer team" by a group of impartial judges.



We are once again holding the annual candy drive to assist Ms. Bengtson with the JOY project. Students can donate candy which is weighted and points are awarded to the House that collects the most. Small gifts and gift cards are also being collected.

A Message from our Guidance Counselor>>>>



As many you may already know, the use of e-cigarettes (vaping) is at epidemic levels in schools around the country. North Dakota is no exception. "Juuling", a slang term for ingesting vaporized, flavored nicotine "juice" in a Juul or other type of electronic cigarette, is among the most popular vaping behaviors for youth, . These devices are available on-line, at local tobacco and vape shops, and convenience stores. Many of the vaping devices resemble USB flash drives and are easily hidden in plain sight. Through my contacts in several North Dakota and Minnesota school districts, I have learned it's common practice for students to covertly vape during school hours in restrooms and even classrooms.

Possession and use of vaping devices to ingest nicotine is unlawful for anyone under 18 years old, just like any other tobacco product. It is a violation of school policy for anyone, regardless of age, to possess or use a vaping device or nicotine juice on school property or at school sponsored events. Participants in extracurricular school activities will lose eligibility if they violate NDHSAA rules for substance use, regardless of age. This includes products containing nicotine.

Please discuss this at home with your child. We believe there is a lack of awareness among students that vaping is equivalent to any other form of tobacco possession and/or use. Richland Jr/Sr High School faculty will be discussing the issue with students in the near future to ensure they are informed. Vaping devices and products are not approved as safe by the FDA, and the long-term health risks to young people is not yet known. What we do know is that nicotine is a highly addictive drug, and any use by youth should be discouraged. Vaping juice can contain high concentrations of nicotine and may even be hazardous through mere skin contact.

BIO Girls is coming to Richland #44 and surrounding communities!>>>>

BIO Girls is a program started by Missy Heilman in Fargo over 5 years ago. It is a program for girls in grades 2-6 that builds self-confidence and life skills through positive mentoring, physical fitness, and Christian-based curriculum. The first program in our area was in Wahpeton this past summer. Under the direction of Anna Marohl and Janelle Berseth, along with 7 other women mentors, 29 girls were involved in the program from the communities of Colfax, Abercrombie, Wyndmere, Breckenridge, Wahpeton, and Campbell. The overwhelming feedback was positive, thereby increasing demand for the program. As a result, we are thrilled to announce that in 2019 we will be adding 2 additional BIO Girls sites to our area, bringing the opportunity to over 100 girls in Wahpeton, Breckenridge, Abercrombie and the surrounding area.



Our program meets weekly over the course of 12 weeks. Each week an age appropriate theme is introduced focusing on topics covering self-image and empowerment, health and wellness, servant leadership, healthy relationships, and kindness and compassion. The girls meet in a large group for an overview and then break into small groups with their mentor to discuss the topic or complete an associated activity. We will have between 10-12 volunteer mentors who help lead our small groups and the large group lessons. The mentors serve as a positive role model, cheerleader, confidant, and work to challenge the girls to gain confidence where necessary.

BIO Girls uses physical fitness, primarily non-competitive running, as a tool to build self-confidence. Children gain confidence by experiencing a series of successes. We provide the girls an opportunity to be successful each week with the workouts which are geared towards helping them accomplish their end goal of a 5K race.



We are currently in our fundraising stage for the 2019 season and have a fundraising goal of \$3500 each year the site is in operation. These funds are used to provide the curriculum and materials that we follow (new curriculum and materials are provided each year), purchase mentor and participant t-shirts, pay for marketing materials, as well as pay race fees for the 5K and help with any additional expenses the site has.

Registration for the program will open April 2-8 and our season begins May 6.

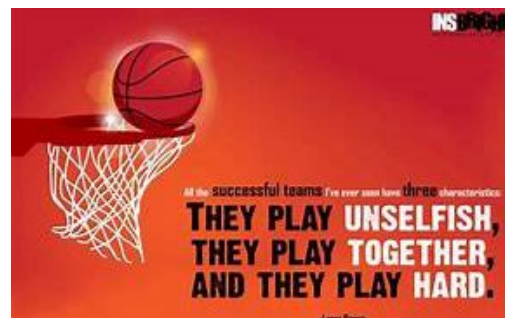

We are getting ready for our 6th annual Joy Project! **What is the Joy Project?** The Joy Project is a community effort to ensure that everybody in Fargo-Moorhead has a delicious Christmas Eve meal and a gift to open. **How do we do it?** By recruiting volunteers and donations to help us share Christmas Eve JOY with over 250 people who are homeless or are at risk of homelessness!

On Christmas Eve, we set up large family style meals at the Gladys Ray Shelter, Dorothy Day House, Project HART (housing for veterans who are homeless), Stepping Stones Resource Center (agency providing support for youth who are homeless or at risk for being homeless) and both Grand Inn hotels. We also cook a meal for families staying at Ronald McDonald House who have a child in the hospital at Christmas time. These meals are delicious! - ham, potatoes, dinner rolls, stuffing, and a ton of Christmas goodies. We also try and have a gift for every person we serve. Especially the guests of the shelters.

I started the Joy Project in 2013 after seeing a school bus dropping children off at the Grand Inn in Moorhead. I quickly realized that the hotel was "home" for those children and that there were many more families living there too! Being so close to Christmas I knew I needed to do something to help them out and that's how the Joy Project was born.

We are a group of caring friends, citizens, and businesses who are working together to reach this goal! Besides donations, we don't have any type of funding. That is why I am so grateful to our community here at Richland #44, for the support!

For the drive we are collecting:

- Bags of candy (used to stuff stockings and gifts)
- \$10 gift cards (McDonalds, Subway, Holiday, Casey's—any place that is easily accessible to people who are homeless)
